I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples. — John 15:5-8

Dear Family of Christ's Church,

Have you ever seen a wild grape vine? The branches are tangled together and encircle one another. The vine's branches can be hard to tell apart as they intertwine together. Yet the origin of each branch can be seen clearly at the point where it connects to the vine. It is the connection to the vine that gives the branch its strength and life. No one branch is better than another. Each branch is valued. Each branch may be a little different, and it's okay to be different. It is the branch's connection to the vine that matters.

To abide in Christ means to dwell in Christ and to be connected to Christ and to one another. As Christians, we are bound to each other as we are bound to God. We are a part of the larger Christian fellowship through which we engage in a common mission to bear witness to the Gospel's message of love. We are different branches of the one vine. Even though we may express our Christian faith in different ways, we are simply different branches on the one vine. What matters most is not the variation between branches but our connection to the vine, our connection to God. It is God who is the source of our fruitfulness, our faithfulness, and our very life. We are all one in Christ's love.

As Methodists, we share a particular expression of our bond in Christ. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church, strongly emphasized our connection to God and to one another as Methodists and as Christians. The Methodist Church, in its various forms, is a "connectional" church. In the term's early usage, the Methodist "connection" referred to the link between John Wesley and his preachers. To be a Methodist preacher, or class leader, one had to be in "connection" with John Wesley. This meant adhering to the basic Doctrines of the Christian faith and committing oneself to Wesley's vision of holiness of heart and mind.

Underlying Wesley's understanding of connection was a conviction that we are bound to God through divine love. This divine love invites us into a participation in the life of the Triune God. As the three persons of the Trinity are bound together by divine love, so too are we bound to God. It is this divine love that binds us to God and to one another. Let us give thanks for all the different branches that are part of the one vine. Let us continue to be faithful disciples working together to share God's love. Let us give thanks for God's love, made flesh in Christ, the love that makes us one.

Report from the Church Office

The start of the school year is always busy, but it proved more than usual for my wife and me. We made the decision to purchase a house in Baraboo, and the deal closed on August 19. However, despite the fact that we were hoping to move in prior to the first day of school, our list of expected renovations grew as we proceeded through them. At first, we thought it was only some of the basement carpeting that would need to be replaced; the discovery of black mold underneath those carpets—in the room that was meant to be the master bedroom—quickly rewrote those plans. We have since taken out all drywall four feet up from the ground in half the basement, sealed some found cracks in the concrete, and installed new mold-resistant drywall. Once the drywall is done, we can resume with our painting and flooring expectations. However, we will also need to replace all of our kitchen appliances. We knew at least the dishwasher was broken and would need to be replaced, but when we found issues with the fridge, stove, and overhead vent (all of which were original to the 1974 house), since replacement parts and schematics couldn't be found, we'll need to get those replaced too. And we haven't even touched any renovations in the main bathroom, as we had found mold in the drywall there as well. Our delayed move-in date was meant to be the weekend of September 20-21, and, in light of all of these additional projects, neither Chay nor I are fully expecting that everything will be finished prior to moving in. However, I am very thankful that our parents

have been so courteous and willing to assist with their time and experience.

Once I have moved into this Baraboo residence, I will begin hybrid work for the ACWV churches. What this means is that I will only be in the charge office once a week—on Thursdays, at the usual time—to perform tasks like final preparations of the bulletins and of the church spaces and checking mail. For my usual Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday hours, I will be working remotely from Baraboo—producing the bulletins, responding to emails, and answering any phone calls that come into the office. I want to thank the SPRC and Marty Richards for their willingness to make this arrangement work and for the assistance I have needed in pivoting to this new arrangement.

Strangely, I didn't expect these renovations and moves to be happening at the same time the Willow Valley trustees were renovating the Sextonville parsonage! I hope their process has not been as full of surprises as mine!

Month in Review

The churches remained busy in the past month! On August 1, Pastor Grace held an open house at her parsonage. It was the first time any ACWV pastor had held an open house in recent memory. This was held in the Richland Center UMC parsonage in Richland Center, on West Fern Street. RC congregants had noted that it was the first time many of them had even seen inside the parsonage. This being done to bring the property up to date and offer it as a rental property like Ash Creek's parsonage. With the last projects expected to be wrapped up in the next month, I want to thank Kyle Dickey, Annette Louis, Aaron Jones, and all the youth for all of their time and labor they've put into the parsonage.

The Month Ahead

The coming months look even busier! Willow Valley's Growing in God (GIG) youth program is returning on Wednesday, September 17! The sessions will be weekly from 5:15pm to 7:00pm, the same as last year.
